Arriving into Cork:



By Air:

Regarded as the international gateway to the South of Ireland, Cork Airport is uniquely positioned at the start of Ireland's Ancient East and the Wild Atlantic Way. It is the country's second busiest and best-connected international airport with connectivity to over 60 routes prior to Covid-19 restrictions.

Cork Airport is extremely well connected with the United Kingdom with flights landing in 12 airports across the country. Cork Airport also offers direct flights to and from most major European cities and not forgetting the option of stopover flights which further expands Cork's

connectivity with the rest of Europe and the world.

Cork International Airport is located less than 10 minutes' drive from Cork City centre and is easily accessible with a good road network and regular bus and taxi services available outside the airport terminal building. A Car Hire service is also available at Cork International Airport. Choose from 6 different car hire companies; Avis, Budget/Payless, Enterprise, Europcar, Hertz or Sixt. You can also book your vehicle

prior to your arrival, simply visit:

You also have the option of flying into Dublin, Shannon or even Kerry Airport. You can get from Dublin Airport to Cork City in just under 3 and a half hours via the M6 motorway. Equally the N8 will get you to Cork City from Shannon Airport in approximately 1 hour 45 mins. A short hour and thirty minute drive through the glossy green countryside will bring you from Kerry Airport into Cork City.

By Road:

Cork is connected to Ireland's capital city, Dublin, via the motorway and will see you travel between the two cities in just under 3 hours. You can also easily access Dublin Airport from the motorway without having to drive through the busy, bustling city centre of Dublin. Once you near the end of the motorway you will be directed by road signs (of which there are plenty so don't panic!) towards the M50 so you can continue on through to Dublin Airport which generally only adds an additional 25mins to your journey.

Flying into Shannon Airport?
That's no problem! Your drive to
Cork should take you little over
1hr 30mins along the N8 so you'll
be with us in no time at all.

A new Disability Toll Exemption Scheme launched in February 2020 to centralise exemption across all Toll roads within Ireland. Disabled motorists driving adapted vehicles continue to be exempt on arrival at all Toll roads within Ireland. Visit www.dtes.ie for further information.

Motorway service stations have designated parking and accessible toilet facilities. Assistance with petrol can be given by attendants. In the event of a breakdown or accident and an orange Emergency Roadside Telephone is not nearby, dial 999 on your mobile phone, or contact the Motorway Emergency Service at 0818-715-100 or operator@nraits.ie.

Bus Éireann, the national public bus service, has a high quality (and affordable) bus network connecting the county with Dublin, Limerick, Galway and many more destinations. Buses usually operate from 6am until midnight. Bus Éireann are fully committed to becoming fully accessible. Currently, Commuter and Expressway services are operating at 78% wheelchair accessibility.

There are also a generous number of private bus companies that offer low-cost, express services from most major towns and cities across Ireland, including Dublin Airport, namely Air Coach (www.aircoach.ie/), GoBus.ie (www.gobus.ie) and City Link (www.citylink.ie/) and to name just a few.



By Rail:

If you want to put your feet up and do some window gazing at Cork's lush green countryside traveling by rail is the way to go. Cork City's Train Station (Kent Station) is a mere 5 minute walk from Parnell Place Bus Station. Operating since 1893, Kent Station in Cork City operates as a hub for intercity services to Dublin, Limerick, Waterford and Tralee. A typical train journey from Cork to Dublin's Heuston Station can take as little as 2hrs 15mins — depending on the time of travel.

larnród Éireann (Irish rail service) endeavours to offer all customers a hassle free service while traveling on their rail services.
Assistance will be given to
customers to board the trains
along with alight at arrival
destination. Passengers needing
assistance should contact larnród
Éireann at least 24 hours in
advance of their journey to ensure
the best service is made available
and arrive at the station 30
minutes prior to the departure of
their train. Customers travelling
with large amounts of luggage are
advised to travel with a
companion.

Ireland +353 1 8366222) Monday to Friday 07.00 hours - 19.00 hours and Saturday and Sunday 08.00 hours - 18.00 hours excluding Public Holidays.

For customers with mobility issues, ramps are made available when boarding and disembarking the train (in certain cases, 24 hours' notice must be given so that staff can be deployed to unstaffed stations to aid with these). Designated parking is given to those with mobility issues at all train stations and all stations provide access to at least one train platform.

Getting around Cork:



By Car:

The easiest way to travel around Cork is by car or motorbike. You'll have the freedom to not just see the main attractions but also get off the 'beaten track' and discover hidden gems. Most international car hire companies operate in Cork. In order to rent a car in Ireland, you must present a valid driver's license and a credit card. Please note, we drive on the left-hand side. There are also a number of taxi operators in Cork city that offer fully accessible taxis. One such company ABC Taxis also offer wheelchair accessible taxis which can be booked on 1800-855-688.

By Train:

If you want to put your feet up and do some window gazing at Cork's lush green countryside traveling by rail is the way to go. Cork's rail network in the east runs from the Titanic's last port of call in Cobh to Midleton (home of the famous Jameson Distillery). In the west it runs from Cork City to Mallow (Mallow Castle). By Bus:

Buses are a great way to travel especially on longer journeys. Bus Éireann operate a huge number of routes from Cork City centre to all parts of Cork including towns and villages on the Wild Atlantic Way and Ireland's Ancient East. Cork's main bus station is located at Parnell Place in the city centre, all intercity services to the county leave from here. All Bus Éireann City and Town services are fully accessible. Designated wheelchair spaces/destination announcements/ramps from path onto the bus. For more information visit: www.buseireann.ie/

Cork City Tours also operates a Hop-On-Hop-Off sightseeing service around Cork City Centre with limited wheelchair access. Pre-booking essential in order to ensure an accessible bus is available. More information is available at: www.corkcitytours.com/

By Bike:

You will also find that Coca Cola Zero Rental Bikes operate in and around Cork City centre and are a very efficient means of travelling through Cork City. There are two Coca Cola Zero bike docks located at Kent Station, one at either entrance, so if you're travelling light and need to get across the city then cycling may be the best means for you. There are over 30 bike dock locations in the city making this is the ideal way to get around and see all the sights. Bikes are available from 6am to midnight. Journeys of 30 minutes or less are free and visitors can sign up for a 3-day pass using a credit card. For more information: www.bikeshare.ie/cork.html

JAM Card:





What is JAM Card and who is it for:

JAM Card allows people with a communication barrier tell others they need 'Just A Minute' discreetly and easily.

For those with a learning difficulty, autism or any condition where there can be a communication barrier, the JAM Card allows users to relay to others that they may need a little extra time in a simple, effective non-verbal manner. The JAM Card is useful when on public transport, in a retail or any other customer facing environment.

The JAM Card© was created by NOW Group, a social enterprise that supports people with learning difficulties and autism into jobs with a future and their service users told them that they would like a way to relay to people that they need a little extra time or patience. There are 3 message options to choose from:

- 1) Please be patient, I have autism
- 2) Please be patient, I have a learning disability/difficulty
- 3) Please be patient, I have a condition

Where can I get one:

There are several different methods to get a JAM Card.

In Cork they can be collected from Kent Train Station and TFI Local Link offices in Bantry and Fermoy.

Or if you would prefer not to use the physical card, there is a JAM Card app available for Android and iOS. The app allows you to choose your message option, leave reviews and find other JAM friendly businesses.
